Comment for Ariel who wanted a comment on the existing guidelines and whether we should change. Please shout if you have a problem.

"Our guidelines on the use of sources are clear and allow for situations where a credible single source is involved, as was the case here. Political journalism would be well nigh impossible if every story emanating from senior politicians required several sources. The Today story was based on someone who was in a position to know, who had been reliable in the past, and was confirming and clarifying something which was already coming to the BBC and other news organisations from the intelligence community. We remain reluctant as a general rule to rely on only one source, but from time to time a single significant source will be enough. The decision to publish must always be based on careful editorial judgement."
